What's a fellowship?


It is:

Benefits for Libraries

Completing Projects

- Remember all those things you just mentioned? A Fellow can help with that!
- Students do really great work and bring new ideas into the workspace
 - Seriously, students do REALLY great work, (Keyes & Dworak, 2017)
- Harsh reality Libraries are understaffed, and graduate students are more affordable that full time staff

Fellows Provide Unique Perspectives

- New ideas from a new generation of Librarians
- Students ask questions and challenge the status quo
- Symbiotic learning experience Current employees can learn from Fellows, just as Fellows are
 learning from the current employees

Mentorship Benefits Everyone

- Mentorship sets the fellowship apart from other graduate students positions
- Lacy & Copeland (2013) discovered huge benefits not only for the LIS students being mentored,

but also for the Librarian mentors themselves, including:

- o a strengthened commitment to the profession,
- o a better understanding of their own work,
- o and the ability to stay more current than usual within their areas of practice. (p. 142).

Benefits for Students

Meaningful Experience

- Employers expect experience
- Fair number of entry-level jobs, but more experience preferred (Tewell, 2012)
- Fight imposter syndrome!
