Featured Library Employee

Meet this issue's Featured Library Employee for the Missouri Library Association, Jim Coombs!

What is your name, your library, and your role at the library?

Jim Coombs, Missouri State University Meyer Library, Maps and GIS Librarian

What originally got you interested in working at a library?


I majored in geography as an undergraduate at Ball state University and used the map library's resources. I decided that working in a map library would be the perfect job for me.

What keeps you coming back every day?

The reference service is my favorite part of library work. Also, I get to draw maps for professors' books!

What's challenging about your work?

Keeping up with the changes in computer mapping.



Yes, in my computer mapping work, I'm curious about the accuracy of the source data I use.

Who is one of your mentors?

David Cobb, who was Map Librarian at the University of Illinois when I had a 2-year internship there in 1978-80. It was my first professional library job after getting my Master's in Map Librarianship and he taught and showed me how to manage a map library.

What book, author, artist, show, or music are you engaging with this week, either personally or professionally? Persuade us in one or two sentences that we should pick this up, too.

Brook Blevins' three volume A History of the Ozarks offers a comprehensive history of the region. The first volume came out in summer 2018. Blevins tries to write history books that connect with common folks. He wants people in the Ozarks to know they have a valuable regional history of their own and take pride in it.

Is there anything else you'd like to share with us?

I went to China in 1985 as the only Maps & GIS specialist in an ALA delegation of 50 librarians. We toured libraries in Beijing, Xian, Chengdu and Shanghai. We also toured the Great Wall, the Forbidden City, and the buried army of terra cotta soldiers. It's very hard to describe what we experienced compared to life in China today. Back then, there was a heavy military presence and we experienced travel delays while they scrutinized our documents. We were stared at as the first Caucasian people the Chinese had seen. The only people who had cars were military and Government officials. Everyone else rode bicycles or walked. I described the experience as "I might as well have gone to Mars, because everything in the Chinese cultural experience was so completely different from what I grew up with in the U.S." I still cherish the experience.

Our Missouri: SHSMO Launches Podcast Series



The State Historical Society of Missouri launched its newest digital endeavor, "Our Missouri," a podcast about the state's people, places, culture, and history in September 2018. Each episode engages with experts and scholars on topics related to the state and its past. New episodes are posted twice a month on SHSMO's website at shsmo.org/our-missouri. The podcast can also be accessed by subscribing through Apple iTunes or Google Play. SHSMO oral historian Sean Rost hosts the podcast. Strategic communications associate Brian Austin serves as producer, and staff member Kevin Walsh provides the credit narration.

In the inaugural episode, Rost spoke with SHSMO president Bob Priddy about his book, *The Art of the Missouri Capitol*, coauthored with Jeffrey Ball. Subsequent episodes have featured conversations with Caroline Fraser, Pulitzer Prize-winning author of *Prairie Fires: The American Dreams of Laura Ingalls Wilder* as well as a three-part series called "Missouri and The Great War" that commemorated the 100th anniversary of the end of World War I in November 2018. December episodes featured Bill Eddleman, associate director of

the Cape Girardeau Research Center, discussing genealogy and his current term as president of the Missouri State Genealogical Association, and Michael Sweeney, SHSMO bicentennial coordinator, explaining the partnerships and programs currently under way in anticipation of Missouri's bicentennial in 2021. Explore Exodus: Images of Black Migration Exhibition at February 4 Event in Columbia

Join SHSMO's Joan Stack and Faith Ordonio at 4 p.m. on February 4 in Room 114A of the University of Missouri's Ellis Library for a curators' presentation of *Exodus: Images of Black Migration in Missouri and Beyond, 1866–1940.* Stack and Ordonio will offer their insights on the exhibition, which explores the experiences of thousands of African Americans who came to and through Missouri while seeking greater political, economic, and social opportunity. Images from SHSMO's collections illustrate the movement of African Americans from their first great exodus out of the South after the Civil War to subsequent relocations sparked by violence, repression, natural disasters, and the turmoil of the Great Depression. The artwork includes fine art prints by George Caleb Bingham and Thomas Hart Benton. The exhibition will be on display in the Ellis Library Colonnade from January 11 to February 28 as part of MU's commemoration of Black History Month. This event is possible thanks to sponsorship from the University of Missouri Libraries and the MU Black History Month Committee.

The sixty-first annual Missouri Conference on History, hosted by the University of Missouri–Kansas City and Park University and sponsored by the State Historical Society of Missouri, will be held March 6–8 at the Holiday Inn Country Club Plaza in Kansas City. New Exhibition at St. Louis Research Center Celebrates Marlin Perkins: Wild Life



Missouri native Marlin Perkins lived a truly wild life. In addition to serving as the director of the Lincoln Park Zoo in Chicago and then the St. Louis Zoo, Perkins also hosted two popular television programs: *Zoo Parade* (1949–1957) and the award-winning *Mutual of Omaha's Wild Kingdom*, which ran for twenty-six seasons starting in 1961. A new exhibition, *Marlin Perkins: Wild Life*, draws from more than two thousand photographs within Perkins's personal papers at SHSMO's St. Louis Research Center. The show explores legendary, dangerous, funny, and touching moments captured on camera and in writing that highlight Perkins's life and his contributions to wildlife conservation. The exhibition will run throughout 2019 at the St. Louis Research Center, located in the Thomas Jefferson Library on the University of Missouri–St. Louis campus.

MOBIUS Renames Scholarship to Honor Robin Kespohl and Selects 2019 Recipient

Each year, MOBIUS invites staff from member libraries to apply for a scholarship to attend the annual Innovative Users Group (IUG) Conference. The scholarship funds conference registration, transportation, and accommodation costs for one individual each year.

Beginning in 2019, the scholarship will officially be renamed the Robin Kespohl IUG Conference Scholarship, in recognition of her invaluable contribution to the success of MOBIUS. Robin passed away in early 2018, and MOBIUS honors her hard work and dedication by renaming this scholarship in her memory.

Robin worked for MOBIUS for seven years, and during her tenure, played an integral role in its initial success. According to George Rickerson, the first Executive Director of MOBIUS, "Robin was responsible for getting the initial clusters up and running and it was due to her amazing intelligence, energy, grace, wisdom, and determination that it was so successful. It is not hyperbole to say that it would not have happened without her, at least not on time and certainly not as smoothly."

The 2019 recipient of the Robin Kespohl IUG Conference Scholarship is Paula Albers, the Electronic Resources Librarian at Webster University. Paula will attend her first IUG Conference in this May in Phoenix, Arizona.

Missouri Evergreen News

Missouri Evergreen welcomed some new members recently! Ray County Library and Heartland Regional Library joined the resource-sharing consortium, bringing the total member libraries to 45. Camden County Library began the migration process in December and will migrate in February 2019, followed by Ray County in April, Seymour Community Library in June, and Heartland Regional Library in July. Missouri Evergreen is still accepting new members and hopes you will join this wonderful resource-sharing consortium!

Missouri Evergreen's Circulation Committee held a workshop on November 16th at Scenic Regional Library's St. Clair branch, to discuss circulation functionality in the web-based staff client. The workshop drew 14 people from 9 different libraries in the consortium. Missouri Evergreen also held its December membership meeting in-person before the Missouri Public Library Director's meeting.

Missouri Evergreen is in its seventh year and comprises 45 member systems--41 live on Evergreen--representing over 100 locations, containing more than 3 million items, over 1.4 million bibliographic records, and over 600,000 patrons.

The Missouri Evergreen website, <u>http://libraries.missourievergreen.org</u>, contains more information about the consortium, including member libraries, steps to join, past meeting information, and borrowing/lending statistics.

The mission of Missouri Evergreen is to provide a shared integrated library system to increase resource sharing among Missouri public libraries. Administered by MOBIUS, it is supported by the Institute of Museum and Library Services under the provision of the Library Services and Technology Act as Administered by the Missouri State Library, a division of the Office of the Secretary of State.

Conscious Connections Training

Early this month, I had the opportunity to travel to Saint Joseph to attend the Conscious Connections training from Saroj Ghoting. The training focused on ensuring library staff working with very young children understand their role in helping build the early literacy skills of our youngest patrons. Early literacy skills, or components were examined through the Talk, Sing, Read, Write, and Play strategies. Then, participants tried their hand at practicing the development of programming to support skill development. Ideas for using Dialogic Reading to share books with young children were shared, acknowledging the importance of adult/child interactions for language development.

During this event I was again struck by the importance of the information being shared and the necessity of professional development in order to confidently and effectively promote and build early literacy. Work in early childhood takes a unique skill set, is taxing, and demanding. Background knowledge of child development and the reasons certain techniques are used is vital to success. Developmentally appropriate practices, best practices, family engagement, these are all areas that should be explored when working with young children and families alongside collection development, information retrieval, and research strategies. Knowing, valuing, and understanding the importance of the early years, where all our patrons begin, should be the building blocks of our profession.

Saroj's training was effective in helping build the skills of staff working with young children. The creativity of librarians is continuously astounding and the ideas presented not only by Saroj but the attendees of this event were remarkable. Thank you to Saint Joseph Public Library for hosting this important event.

Daniel Boone Regional Library

The Daniel Boone Regional Library will be opening a library facility in Holts Summit in 2019. Plans have been in the works for several months and were finalized with the signing of an agreement for the library to occupy a 7,200 square feet space in the Summit Plaza in Holts Summit.

"The bookmobile stop in Holts Summit has been our busiest stop for many years," said Margaret Conroy, DBRL Executive Director. "We added the Library-To-Go lockers and a book drop at Holts Summit City Hall in 2013 as a way to expand services to this area; so when local developer Marty Wilson approached us about opening a library facility in the Summit Plaza, we seriously considered his proposal. This new location will improve access to library services in this part of the county, and we think people will use the library even more than they do now." Conroy expects that the facility will be ready to open sometime in February after the computer networking, library materials and all the furnishings are in place.

Like the other DBRL locations, people with a library card will be able to check out books in a variety of formats (eBooks, audiobooks and large print), movies, TV shows and music CDs. People can also use internet-enabled computers and free wireless access, as well as attend classes for adults and children.

The Holts Summit Public Library will have a larger collection of materials than what is available on the bookmobile. DBRL is ordering new books, using \$35,000 from the DBRL Foundation, monies that a donor requested be used to buy new materials for Callaway County. The rest of the collection will be duplicate copies from other DBRL facilities and donated materials.

The bookmobile will continue making its regular visits and the Library-To-Go lockers and the book drop will remain at the Holts Summit City Hall until the new facility opens.

Mid-Continent Public Library

Mid-Continent Public Library's Story Center Hosts '1,000 Footsteps' Exhibit

From November through January, MCPL's Woodneath Library Center will house a special new exhibit called **1,000 Footsteps Tell the Story**. Each month, the exhibit—located across from the Barista de Casa Café in the Library—will feature a unique quilt that depicts the creator's journey from her home country to the United States.

Created by students of the <u>Once We Were Refugees</u> program, a Kansas City-area organization that offers vocational classes to resettled refugees, each quilt serves as a visual representation of the family's flight from home—often to refugee camps in other countries before arriving in the U.S.

"We're honored to bring this exhibit to Library customers and local residents," said Mark Livengood, Director of MCPL's Story Center. "Not only is each quilt a testament to the strength and perseverance of the person who created it; it is also an inspiring form of storytelling that focuses on the bonds of family."

The quilts in the 1,000 Footsteps exhibit share stories of families from South Sudan, Iraq, and Syria. Alongside each quilt, there is an explanation of the journey and a photo of the artist. In addition to the exhibit, The Story Center hosted a conversation on November 28 at the Woodneath Library Center where attendees learned more about the artists' journeys, the exhibit, and Once We Were Refugees.

Funded by a grant from the Ewing Marion Kauffman Foundation, The Story Center at Mid-Continent Public Library was developed to help people create and share their own stories and connect with the stories of others. The kits can be reserved through MCPL's online catalog and are available to customers at all 31 branches for a checkout period of 28 days. looking to brush up on their civics knowledge.



MCPL Upgrades Branches as Capital Plan Continues

As part of Mid-Continent Public Library's five-year Capital Improvement Plan, which launched in spring 2018, six Library branches have been renovated (Weston, Oak Grove, Platte City, Excelsior Springs, Antioch, and Blue Springs South), and several others are currently closed for construction (Lone Jack, Camden Point, Dearborn, Edgerton, Kearney, and Claycomo). Design work for the five-year Capital Plan is being completed by Sapp Design Architects and Helix Architecture + Design with JE Dunn assuming responsibility for construction contractor management.



While the upgrades at each branch have varied based on community needs and building conditions, the Library has focused on creating more intentional spaces and upgrading essential technology throughout. In particular, many of the renovated branches now offer devoted areas for children and teens as well as enclosed programming and meeting rooms that can be used by the Library or reserved by customers.

Following the reopening of each renovated branch, MCPL has held ribboncutting ceremonies with local elected officials and Library leadership as well as open house events for the public with live entertainment, refreshments, and a mobile scavenger hunt through the free GooseChase app. In addition, at both the ribbon-cutting events and open houses, Library staff are giving away special commemorative tokens (one per person) that can be used one time to clear all Library fines and fees up to \$10.



Along with upgrading each of its 31 existing branches, the Library will add two new locations by 2022. One of these new branches will be a 18,500square-foot branch located in Lee's Summit at Blue Parkway and Battery Road just east of Todd George Road (just north of 50 Highway). The Library purchased a piece of land for this purpose in fall 2018. The second new location will be added in Independence, bringing MCPL's total number of branches to 33.

MCPL's Capital Improvement Plan was made possible by the passage of Proposition L by voters in November 2016, which gave the Library its first increase in funding in 33 years. In addition to upgrading its facilities, Prop L has allowed the Library to expand branch hours, enhance special services, augment early literacy efforts, and buy more materials.

MagicBox[®] is an innovative display cabinet that combines the physical and the digital, giving people an intriguing way to see original and animated content in the same space. MagicBox[®] allows us to combine physical objects with video or interactive 3-D renderings so visitors can study it, manipulate it and experience it more fully with their fingertips using a touch-screen in the front glass of the display case.

Death & Dying Series Draws People Eager to Learn and Talk

The Library's second Death & Dying: Conversations on End-of-Life Matters series reached more than 750 people during eight programs Nov. 1–6. The series kicked off on Nov. 1 at Relics Event Center, where 420 people of all ages filled every chair in the building to hear L.A-based mortician and author Caitlin Doughty talk about death customs from around the world. Attendees traveled from as far away as Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and Little Rock, Arkansas, to hear the YouTube personality, who commented that the event was the biggest of its type during her three-week nationwide tour. More than 200 people attended a trio of events on Saturday, Nov. 3, at the Library Center, including an End-of-Life Legal Matters workshop; a Hospice Resource Fair with representatives from a dozen area hospices; and a Día de los Muertos Community Celebration featuring performances by Grupo Latinoamericano dance troupe.







Springfield Symphony Pays Musical Tribute to WWI



The Library Center's main floor was turned into a concert hall when the Springfield Symphony performed a musical tribute to World War I on Sunday, Nov. 11. The event coincided with the exact time, date and month of the centennial anniversary of the 1918 Armistice Day. The WWI-era music was mixed with readings of letters from soldiers and civilians who served. After the concert, attendees visited the Missouri and the Great War exhibit, and attended a reception sponsored by the Friends of the Library. The concert was part of a series that concluded Saturday, Nov. 17, at the Library Center with a talk by Michael Neiberg, a nationally recognized scholar on war studies.
